JUNIOR CULTURAL ARTS

Requirements:

- Open to 4-H members enrolled in drama, theater arts, folk arts, music, visual arts and crafts, and other cultural arts projects, including computer-generated art projects or an alternative project which follows 4-H project guidelines, and to members of other youth organizations doing equivalent work.
- Posters or displays not to exceed 14" x 22".

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- Group of three different articles. Articles to be exhibited must be hand cut and in original design. Tie together.
- Article made from a kit
- Separate item (see Leather Project Manual)

- All entries for an individual may be included on the same form. Do not include entries for more than one person on the same form. If you need additional entry forms contact the UW-Extension office at 608-297-3141.
- As an exhibitor we ask that you respect the following:
 - Smoking is not allowed in any building on the grounds.
 - Vehicle and trailer parking is not allowed around the barns, except during loading and unloading of animals.
 - Livestock trailers must be parked in the designated areas as determined by the Fair Board.
- Primitive camping is allowed only in designated areas on the grounds for a minimal fee.

Note: All departments include requirements and/or class/lot specific instructions. Please make sure to read and follow all special instructions. If requirements are not followed, the overall placing will be dropped one place level. (For example if the items in the sample were not tied together, and the exhibitor received a 1st placing, it would be reduced to 2nd place for not following the requirements.

GENERAL RULES:

JUNIOR and OPEN CLASS DIVISIONS

(1) All OPEN CLASS and JUNIOR DIVISION entries will close at 4:30 p.m. on the first Friday in June of the fair year. Adding to entries will be accepted until July 1st.

(2) Only one article under each Lot Number may be entered by the exhibitor.

(3) Only articles which have never been displayed before will be accepted.

(4) All work must be done by the exhibitor.

(5) All exhibitors are required to carry liability insurance on exhibits. Proof of insurance may be required.

(6) Marquette County Youth Organization Association, Inc., nor Marquette County, shall neither be liable for any loss or damage to exhibits.

(7) Each exhibitor must securely attach official Marquette County Fair entry tags to the article to be exhibited, before it is brought to the Fair. Untagged articles will not be accepted. It is also recommended that exhibitors attach the exhibit number to the article using an additional method, such as masking tape.

(8) Fair management reserves the right to dispose of ALL food exhibited in OPEN CLASS, and JUNIOR DIVISION Departments and Classes. Ribbons and entry tags must be picked up from foods exhibits at 4:00 p.m. on Sunday.

(9) Department superintendents have full charge of exhibits and their arrangements.

(10) The Board of Directors of the Marquette County Youth Organization, Association, Inc., has the final decision on all rules. Any complaints must be made in writing. Any emergency not provided for in these rules shall be referred to the Marquette County Youth Organization, Association, Inc., and their decision shall be final.

DIVISION J - JUNIOR FAIR

(1) Junior exhibitors need not be members of Marquette County to exhibit at the fair. They must however meet the following: at least be in 3rd grade but under 20 years of age as of January 1 of the fair year and belong to and be in good standing in 4-H, FFA, Scouts, breed groups or any other youth organization under adult supervision that has an education program appropriate to that organization and is approved by the fair board. All Junior Exhibitors must have the leader of their Youth Program sign their entry form before submitting to the UW-Extension office.

(2) JUNIOR DIVISION entry times are as follows:

Wednesday, 5:00-8:00 p.m. – Required – Jr. Division Swine, Sheep, Meat Goats, Rabbits and Poultry
Wednesday, 3:00 – 8:00 p.m. Jr. Non-Animal Exhibits
Thursday, 7:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. Jr. Division Animal Exhibits (Dairy, Dairy Goats, Horses, Beef)

(3) Absolutely no JUNIOR DIVISION fair exhibits will be accepted Friday morning.

(4) JUNIOR DIVISION participants will exhibit only in the particular division or divisions that pertain to the project work which they are carrying as a project.

(5) Exhibits in the JUNIOR DIVISION are not eligible for exhibit in OPEN CLASS DIVISION. This includes individual and group classes in all phases of exhibits.

(6) In all Jr. Fair non-animal departments, projects will be judged face to face. Four group placings will be followed in the JUNIOR DIVISION. In all animal departments Danish judging will be applied.

(7) In Departments designated by the Marquette County Youth Organization Association, Inc., as Individual Conference Judged Departments, judges will use their discretion in placing premiums based on the learning achieved by the exhibitor and the merit of the article, as items are presented between 3:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. Four levels of placings are available to be used in this award method. Danish system of judging will be used as a guide.

(8) JUNIOR DIVISION Exhibit release times are:

Horse exhibits – Horses will be released on Saturday upon completion of show.

Meat auction animals – 3:00p.m. on Sunday

All other exhibits: 4:00 PM on Sunday

Exhibitors who fail to clean out their stalls to the satisfaction of the Superintendent will forfeit all premium money.

ANIMAL/LIVESTOCK RULES: JUNIOR and OPEN DIVISIONS

(1) All required animal health records must be presented to the appropriate Animal/Livestock Superintendent prior to the unloading of animals. Health records for Dairy Department exhibits should be delivered to the Fair Veterinarian before animals are unloaded at the fairgrounds. Unloading must be done only with the approval of the appropriate Animal/Livestock Superintendent.

(2) All animals exhibited should be identified by registration name and number or by eartag number. Rabbits are to be tattooed. Any other arrangements must be made with the Fair board in conjunction with the designated veterinarian prior to the start of the fair.

(3) All animal/livestock exhibitors must clean their pens, stalls, or cages and check-out with the appropriate Animal/Livestock Superintendent before leaving the fairgrounds or forfeit their premium money.

(4) Stall rent for OPEN CLASS and JUNIOR DIVISION animals will not be charged. All feed and bedding must be furnished by the exhibitor.

(5) Livestock that has been properly fitted and given proper care will be eligible to receive premium money. All animals that are in poor condition or that show lack of care, as identified by Animal/Livestock Superintendent, will be disqualified and no prize money awarded.

(6) Vehicles and trailers will not be allowed to park in the loading ramp or barn area at any time during the fair except for unloading and loading.

(7) Livestock trailers must be parked in the designated area across the track.

(8) It is the exhibitor's responsibility to be in compliance with Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) Animal Health Rules and Regulations for animals exhibited at the Marquette County Fair.

MIGHTY MIGHTS SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST

Purpose

To give children 4-8 years-of-age an opportunity to show beef or dairy calves at the Marquette County Fair.

Advance registration is suggested to estimate the number of participants however any child can show by registering the day of the show.

Register by calling UW-Extension 608-297-3141, or with the Dairy Superintendent the day of the show.

Requirements:

Ages are of January 1st of the exhibit year.

Calves may be brought on the day of the show (Saturday) and taken home the same day. If a stall is needed, check with Dairy Superintendent. Calves must be born after April 1st of the exhibit year and may be either sex and any breed.

Exhibitors show at their own risk. Marquette County Youth Organization Association, Inc., is not responsible for injuries.

All exhibitors will be awarded a T-shirt and a Participation Ribbon, sponsored by Sand Country Veterinary Service, Westfield.

Animal Health Regulations for Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin: 2016 Season

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions only. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so you should always check our website or contact us for current information

<p>General requirements for show organizers</p>	<p>Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all livestock daily</p> <p>Fairs or exhibitions lasting less than 24 hours must have a licensed veterinarian or show chairperson review all required records and test results to check for:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Exhibitor's name and address • Animal identification (number, type, description) • Compliance with disease testing and other health requirements • Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated <p>Fair management must maintain records for 5 years of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Exhibitors • Livestock premises numbers, if any • Animal identification
<p>Diseases</p>	<p>Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may be removed immediately, and may be quarantined or slaughtered.</p> <p>Bovine animals with ringworm, mange or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds they are incapable of transmitting disease.</p>
<p>Cattle and bison</p>	<p>Cattle from within Wisconsin have no requirements for tests or health documents.</p> <p>Cattle from outside Wisconsin must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) documenting official animal ID and all required tests and certifications • Have at least one form of official individual ID (including steers) • Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Cattle_Bison) <p>Acceptable animal IDs for all cattle from outside Wisconsin</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag) • 15-digit "840" tags (visual or RFID) • Valid only if applied before March 11, 2015: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Manufacturer-coded RFID tag - 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s ○ American ID tag – 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA" <p>Brucellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Steers are exempt from any brucellosis test requirement • Cattle from brucellosis-free states are exempt from brucellosis testing requirement

<p>Cattle and bison (cont.)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cattle from certified brucellosis-free herds in Class A states do not need brucellosis tests if the CVI has the certified herd number and the last test date • All other cattle need negative brucellosis test within 30 days before entering Wisconsin <p>Tuberculosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin</p> <p>Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin are required for cattle if they originate from:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • States or zones that are Modified Accredited Advanced states or that Wisconsin treats as MAA because they have had bovine TB cases • Modified Accredited states (see section below for Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone) • States that do not recognize Wisconsin's TB-free status • For requirements by state: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Cattle_Bison <p>Cattle from Michigan's TB Free Zone:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Need negative individual TB test within 60 days before arrival in Wisconsin for all animals • Whole herd TB test and import permit not required <p>Cattle from Michigan's MA Zone and other states with MA zones:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Need import permits • Need negative whole-herd TB tests within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin for all animals 1 year and older • Need negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin • Must return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so <p>Cattle from Canada must meet current federal requirements to enter the United States. <p>Swine</p>	<p>Swine from within Wisconsin need a Wisconsin intrastate movement certificate:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Stating that the herd of origin was inspected on the farm within 30 days before the show and showed no signs of disease • Including documentation of all required tests <p>Swine from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection that includes the following: a statement of the PEDv status of the herd of origin (if known), a statement of the PRRS status of the herd of origin (if known), and official identification number.</p> <p>Acceptable methods of ID for swine are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • USDA silver ear tag • USDA 840 button ear tag • Breed association tattoo • An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier • Ear notch (if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered)

Sheep and goats	<p>Sheep and goats from within Wisconsin:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If sexually intact, need official individual ID <i>at any age</i> • If not sexually intact, need official individual ID if they are <i>12 months or older</i> • Official ID may be scrapie ear tags, USDA 840 button ear tag, or breed association tattoo (as long as it is unique to that animal) • Cannot have been exposed to scrapie if they are sexually intact <p>Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Need certificate of veterinary inspection and official individual ID: scrapie ear tag, USDA 840 button ear tag, or breed association tattoo (as long as it is unique to that animal) • By federal rule, the CVI must also include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ a statement by the issuing accredited or state or federal veterinarian that the animals were not exhibiting clinical signs associated with scrapie at the time of examination ○ an owner statement indicating whether the animal is or is not a scrapie-positive, suspect, high-risk or exposed animal and whether it originated in an infected, source, exposed, or noncompliant flock <p>Goats from Michigan's TB Modified Accredited Zone:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Need import permits • Need negative whole-herd TB tests within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin • Need negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin • Must return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so <p>For information on obtaining an import permit:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Online http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Permit_Request • Email DATCPAnimalImports@wi.gov • Call 608-224-4872 <p>Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. Equine	<p>Equine animals from within Wisconsin need documentation of a negative EIA test done within the previous 12 months, which clearly identifies the animal by registration number, lip tattoo, freeze brand, or complete description. Documentation may be:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Official test report VS 10-11, <i>or</i> • USDA-approved electronic test form, <i>or</i> • Global Vet Link EIA electronic form, <i>or</i> • Certificate of veterinary inspection with the test results listed <p>Equine animals from outside Wisconsin need:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) • Negative EIA test done within previous 12 months, which clearly identifies the animal by registration number, lip tattoo, freeze brand, or complete description, and reported on the CVI <p>Equines from Minnesota are exempt from the CVI requirement if:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ownership does not change while the animal is in Wisconsin • The animal remains in Wisconsin no longer than 7 days • Proof of an EIA test in previous 12 months accompanies the animal

<p>Exotic ruminants</p>	<p>Note: <i>Exotic ruminants are ruminants that are not native to Wisconsin, and are not cervids – for example, vicuñas, camels, yaks, water buffalo, pronghorn antelope and giraffes.</i></p> <p>Exotic ruminants from within Wisconsin have no requirements.</p> <p>Exotic ruminants from outside Wisconsin need an import permit and a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) with proof that they meet requirements for:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Bovine TB</i> – negative test required within 60 days before entry • <i>Brucellosis</i> – negative test required within 30 days before entry <p>Please call 608-224-4872 beforehand to determine which TB test to use.</p> <p>For information on obtaining an import permit:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Online http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Permit_Request • Email DATCPAnimalImports@wi.gov • Call 608-224-4872 <p>Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. These birds also need wing or leg band ID. <p>Exotic small animals (any species not covered by "small animals" above), exotic large animals, and other wild animals</p>	<p>Note: <i>Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.</i></p> <p>Animals from within Wisconsin do not have any requirements as long as they are legally possessed in Wisconsin.</p> <p>Animals from outside Wisconsin generally have no testing or vaccination requirements, but do need:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) • Import permit number <p>Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. Note: *Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.*

Animals from within Wisconsin must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

Animals from outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection and vaccinations and tests required for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

They also need import permit numbers if they are:

- Circuses and individual circus acts
- Rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses
- Multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition)
- Petting zoos

They do not need import permit numbers if they are:

- Rodeo horses owned by individual participants
- Single-species groups

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. **Guidelines for
housing and
managing
animals**

The State Veterinarian recommends that exhibitors:

- Vaccinate breeding cattle against bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) at least 30 days before the event
- Test cattle for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Test cattle for Johne's disease test results by ELISA test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport animals to and from the show, and vehicles used at the show, before and after the show
- Isolate exhibited animals returning to their farms or animals purchased at the show for 21 days before mingling them with other stock

The State Veterinarian recommends that show organizers:

- House cattle separately from llamas, vicuñas, alpacas, guanacos, and other exotic ruminants
- House cattle separately from small ruminants, especially sheep
- House ostriches, emus, rheas and cassowaries separately from domestic poultry
- House swine separately from any other mammals
- Include a space for the premises registration code on livestock entry forms
- Provide hand-washing stations near all livestock facilities
- Provide individual watering and feeding troughs rather than common ones

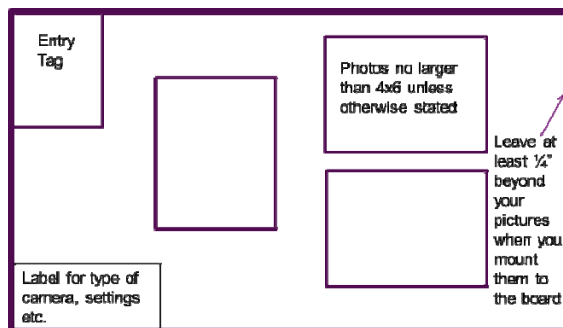

Barn Quilt Block Challenge



Marquette County Barn Quilt Block Contest 2016 Marquette County Fair, July 7-10th

A contest entry is one 12" square fabric quilt block with $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance added on all four sides. All blocks become property of the Marquette County Barn Quilt and Hidden History Murals (BQHHM) committee. Selected blocks will be used to create a new BQHHM fabric quilt.

CONTEST RULES

Size: Blocks must measure 12½" x 12½" from raw edge to raw edge. This will allow a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance on all four sides.

Fabric: Use a good quality 100% cotton quilting fabric.

Technique: Blocks may be pieced by hand or machine. Appliqué blocks may be sewn by machine or hand. You may use fusible web or interfacing. Embellishments such as hand embroidery, ribbons, buttons, and decorative machine stitches are welcome. You can use fabric paint, fabric markers, or fabric crayons to create your block. Three dimensional work or padded is not permitted. Design cannot be made on point, keep block square. Do Not Quilt Your Entry.

Design: Designs must in one of the following categories: 1) a traditional quilt block, 2) a newly created quilt block, or 3) pictures representing the history, culture, flora or fauna of Marquette County. Design cannot be made on point; keep block square.

Eligibility: Open to all ages. Contestants may enter more than one block.

To enter:

1) Bring entries to the Marquette County Fairgrounds Exhibit Building Wednesday, July 6th 2-8pm, or Thursday, July 7th through Saturday, July 9th 10am-9pm. Look in the Exhibit Building for the BQ display. The sooner you enter, the more Viewer's Choice votes you could get.

2) Register your entry using the self-registration form and pin your entry to the display board provided. Incorrectly registered entries may not be eligible for judging. If you have questions, ask the Exhibit Building monitor (wearing orange vest) or ask at the Fair Office at the fairgrounds.

Judging:

Ribbons will be awarded on Sunday, July 10th at 3:00 p.m. for Viewers' Choice and Judges' Choice(s). Contestants need not be present to win.

All blocks become property of the Marquette County Barn Quilt and Hidden History Murals (BQHHM) committee. The Judges' top choice will be constructed into a 2'x2' wooden barn quilt, which will be permanently displayed in the Marquette County Fairgrounds Exhibit Building. Selected blocks will be used to create a new BQHHM fabric quilt.
